EU-League of Arab States Cooperation

Arab and European foreign ministers express profound concern over situation in Syria



The fourth joint meeting between Arab foreign ministers and their European counterparts took place at the headquarters of the Arab League in Cairo on 20 December under the co-chairmanship of Tunisia's foreign minister Khamis Jenhawe, the Arab ministerial council's rotating president, and Federica Mogherini, the High Representative for the European Union for Foreign Affairs and Security Policy.

Ahmed bin Abdulaziz Gattan, Saudi Arabia's ambassador to Egypt and the Kingdom's permanent representative to the Arab League led the Kingdom's delegation to the meeting.

Ministers adopted a joint declaration to conclude the fruitful meeting in which they called for closer collaboration and proposed different mechanisms of cooperation in all fields and at all levels, including a regular Euro-Arab Summit.

Profound concern was expressed about the deteriorating humanitarian situation in Syria, and the airstrikes launched by

the Assad regime against civilians in Aleppo. Moreover, they confirmed their determination to embark on a reconstruction program in Syria once a comprehensive political transitional phase has been reached.

Ministers expressed support for the Yemeni government, led by President Hadi, denouncing unilateral measures taken by Houthi militias and forces loyal to Saleh, referring to the formation of an illegal government recently.

Ministers were unified in reaffirming their adherence to the principles of international law, including the immunity of sovereign states. This immunity is clearly jeopardised by the US JASTA bill.

Finally, reflecting on the recent terrorist attacks across both regions, ministers agreed that, more than ever Europe and the Arab must show determination to jointly prevent and fight terrorism in our territories and globally.

Custodian of the Two Holy Mosques sees bright future for the Kingdom



In his annual address to the Consultative Council, the Custodian of the Two Holy Mosques King Salman bin Abdulaziz underlined that Saudi Arabia remains fully committed to acting decisively to ensure its security and the security of the region while moving forward on the Kingdom's economic development and reforms.

King Salman presented an optimistic outlook for the nation's foreign and domestic policies, noting that Saudi Arabia has played an active and constructive role in the region. In important global undertakings with the international community, he said the Kingdom is proceeding with "firm steps" to maintain its important active role in the region and around the world.

Among the core foreign policy priorities, King Salman vowed to continue cooperating with the international community in combatting the extremism that threatens its borders and the region at

large. Political solutions to international crises can safeguard values of tolerance and coexistence, paving the way for nations to ensure peace and achieve development, King Salman said.

King Salman noted that economic reforms implemented to date have focused on diversifying the nation's economy and re-distributing resources to expand job opportunities. Saudi Arabia has "come out of [the past three years] with a strong economy and continuous growth; we have set out our reforms today to look forward to the future," he noted. The strength of these structural reforms fall under Vision 2030, Saudi Arabia's economic transformation plan.

"I am optimistic about a better tomorrow," King Salman said. "These conditions that we are now experiencing are not more difficult than their previous ones. We will overcome them for a better and brilliant future."
